

Lessons from James Chapter One (Part 1)

One of the great things about spiritual principles is that they are so <u>practical</u>. Chapter 1 of the book of James gives very clear and pointed instructions about the way we ought to live. If you are an inmate, some of these principles apply especially to your



present situation. All of them tell us how to behave and prosper, no matter where we are today or will be tomorrow.

Let's look at those lessons that apply especially while you're incarcerated. Next month we'll look at the rest of the chapter.

Consider it pure joy, my brothers, whenever you face trials of many kinds, because you know that the testing of your faith develops perseverance. Perseverance must finish its work so that you may be mature and complete, not lacking anything. ... Blessed is the man who perseveres under trial, because when he has stood the test, he will receive the crown of life that God has promised to those who love him. (James 1:2-4,12)

Is James saying that you ought to be <u>glad</u> you got sent to jail? Well, maybe. For some of you, going to jail is the best thing that ever happened to you, because it made it possible for you to meet Jesus and give your heart to Him. But in addition to that, God's word is saying here that <u>you need to have a</u> <u>positive attitude</u> about your incarceration. You should be making the best of it—using the time well, for example, to build the habit of reading the Bible and praying, so that God can build your faith. You will never have a better opportunity. You ought to be correcting faults as the Holy Spirit leads you. If you want to, this is where you can <u>start to</u> <u>build a new life that is better than the one</u> <u>you had before</u>. Believe it. Make it your constant goal. Work at it, and never give up. If you do what God says, you will never be sorry.

My dear brothers, take note of this: Everyone should be quick to listen, slow to speak and slow to become angry, for man's anger does not bring about the righteous life that God desires. Therefore, get rid of all moral filth and the evil that is so

prevalent and humbly accept the word planted in you, which can save you. (James 1:19-21)



This reinforces what I just said about starting now to

build a new and better life. You need to change some things—to learn to control a hot temper, for example. To clean up your speech by getting rid of profanity, vulgarity, gossip, put-downs, and negative confessions. To clean up your mind by refusing to have anything to do with pornography, dirty jokes, garbage like that.

But you won't change your habits just by having good intentions. You need to <u>want</u> to, and then you must <u>ask Jesus to change</u> <u>you</u> from the inside out. **"Create in me a clean heart, O God, and renew a right spirit within me,"** King David said in Psalm 51. As you get into the Word more and more, your behavior will change. Psalm 119:9-12 puts it this way:

"How can a young man keep his way pure? By living according to your word. I seek you with all my heart; do not let me stray from your commands. I have hidden your word in my heart that I might not sin



against you. Praise be to you, O LORD; teach me your decrees."

God's word in

your heart will make miraculous changes for the better in your life.

If any of you lacks wisdom, he should ask God, who gives generously to all without finding fault, and it will be given to him. But when he asks, he must believe and not doubt, because he who doubts is like a wave of the sea, blown and tossed by the wind. That man should not think he will receive anything from the Lord; he is a double-minded man, unstable in all he does. (James 1:5-8)

Ah, yes, <u>wisdom</u>! Do you want to be wise? You've tried foolishness, and it didn't work too well. If you had been wiser, you probably would not be spending your time in a cell. We all need all the wisdom we can get. Well, God's word says, ask Him for wisdom! Don't worry about deserving it. Don't worry about anything you might have done in the past—if you've confessed your sins and received salvation, God has forgotten all about those past sins.

<u>Make up your mind</u> that God means what He says, that He'll do what He promises. <u>Forget any doubts</u>. If you ask Him for wisdom, and trust Him, you will get wisdom!


What does applied wisdom look like when you're in jail? I knew a man who had a chip

on his shoulder. Any other inmate, or any guard, for that matter, who rubbed him the wrong way was in for a fight. Eventually he "wised up" and realized he was only making his own life miserable by getting in trouble all the time. It's a shame that it cost him a few extra years in prison, most of it in Maryland's Supermax.

The book of Proverbs says many times, "Get wisdom!" Wasn't it good of God, through James, to tell us how.

So, to summarize these lessons from James:

- Be positive and hang in there—and God will bless you.
- Watch your mouth and your actions—the Holy Spirit wants to clean you up and keep you on the right track. Co-operate!
- Godly wisdom is the very best kind of "smarts" be sure and get some.
