

Respect

**R** espect is something we all care about. It's something our spirits need, in the same way our bodies need nourishment. Getting too little respect is like being starved; getting too much respect is like eating way more food than you need. Both are unhealthy.

Let's consider three aspects of respect:

- 1. Respect for others
- 2. Respect for yourself
- 3. Respect for God.

What does it mean to respect someone? Forget the dictionary definitions; you know from experience what it means. It means that he or she is worthwhile in your eyes. Worth listening to; worth working with or working for, worth spending time to help or teach or encourage, if any of those is appropriate. And not only thinking it, but also showing it by your actions and words. That's respect.

Respect is vital in any healthy relationship. Mutual respect is the glue that holds marriages and families and friendships together. Respect is not the same thing as love, but it is an important element of it. You can act loving toward someone you don't respect; you can feel pity or compassion, or even admiration or envy, toward him or her; but without respect there can be no real bonding, no investing of yourself in the other.

God's word has a lot to say on this subject. It uses the word "respect" in this way fewer than 20 times, but it also uses the word "honor" a lot—for example, "Honor your father and your mother" (Exodus 20:12). "Honor," used in this way, means to have respect, and to show that respect by your actions and words.

## **Getting Respect**

#### How can you get the respect you deserve?

<u>Wrong question!</u> If that's the way you look at things, then chances are you are already getting the respect you deserve, which may not be very much. Let's change the question:

#### How can you get the respect you need?

There are three ways to gain someone's respect:

1. Automatically (subject to later review)

- 2. By being respectable
- 3. By being respectful.

The first way depends on the other person being willing to give you the benefit of the doubt. Many people will do that. Others will not, perhaps because of your skin color or where you came from, or where you did or didn't go to college, or the fact that you have been an inmate. Forget these latter folks—it doesn't matter at all what they think.

If you want thinking people to respect you, the best way to achieve that is to <u>be respectable</u>. And the best way to be respectable, in my opinion, is to let God's Holy Spirit develop in you the character of Jesus, a.k.a. the fruit of the Spirit: Love, Joy, Peace, Patience, Kindness, Goodness, Faithfulness, Gentleness, and Self control

Is that too general a statement? I don't mean it ti be. Look at each of these nine attributes and see it as something that can be developed or improved, with the Holy Spirit's help, in your life:

- Love. Practice being unselfish, rather than selfish. Be a giver rather than a taker,
- **Joy:** Smile, rather than frown. Be slow to complain or condemn; quick to forgive.
- **Peace.** Be as agreeable as possible. Don't start or prolong a fight.
- **Patience.** Don't demand or expect to get what you want immediately. Ease up.
- **Kindness.** Do and say whatever will help; discard anything that might hurt.
- **Goodness.** Stick with whatever is good and true; run far away from whatever is evil and false. You do know the difference.
- **Faithfulness.** Don't say it if you don't mean it. If you promise to do something, do it! Be dependable.
- **Gentleness.** Be strong, stable, a haven of safety and healing and peace; rather than powerful and violent and destructive.
- Self control. There are two big areas to work on here: <u>addictive behavior</u> and <u>temper</u>. Place both securely under God's control— He can do it, and with His help you can be the master, rather than the slave, of your inclinations.

In life there is a principle of reflection. Try this: look in a mirror and smile. What do you see? You see a smiling face. Now frown, and a frown is reflected. In fact, the way you act toward others often has a lot to do with the way they act toward you. In particular, if you are respectful of others, that goes a long way toward their respecting you in return.

Jesus said, "So whatever you wish that others would do to you, do also to them...." (Matthew 7:12 – the "Golden Rule") This is meant to be a guide for your

behavior, but it also involves the principle of reflection—if you do good to others (by respecting them), they are more likely to do the same to you.

Do to others as you would have them do to you.

### Self-Respect

Self-respect is a little more difficult than respect for or from others. The problem is that we know too much about ourselves—or at least we think we do. But if early life has drilled into your mind the idea that you are worthless, that is hard to overcome. So much early learning depends on wise and loving father and mother, because both contribute in major ways to a child's view of himself or herself. And so many of us today, so very many of us, never had two wise and loving parents; maybe never even had one.

If you are loved early in life, you learn that you are lovable. If you receive loving discipline, you come to understand where the boundaries of acceptable behavior are. If you are raised with respect, you will know that you are respectable, and you will have a healthy respect for yourself. But if you lacked these early blessings, all of those vital lessons have to be learned later in life—often in the "school of hard knocks."

If this describes you, then you are handicapped. Your self-respect never had any nourishment, so it never flourished. But there is good news, in two ways.

First is the fact that God loves you. I mean <u>He really</u> <u>loves you</u>. He made you in His own image, and He cares about you, in spite of anything you ever did or didn't do, God loves you. His Son came to earth as a man and He died so that all of our sins, yours and mine— our thoughtlessness, our cruelty, our mess-ups, our selfish acts, even our disrespect for Him— all of that garbage could be washed away, forgiven

and forgotten forever. That's how much you are worth to Him. God really, really loves you.

The second path to self-respect is what I explained above. If you want to come to respect yourself, the way to do it is to become respectable, and act respectfully toward yourself. Don't get down on yourself or call yourself names. If you make a mistake, forgive yourself and resolve not to do it again. It may not be easy to overcome all of the past, but with God's help everything is possible.

# Respect for God

Why should we respect God? First of all, because He demands it and <u>commands</u> it "I am the Lord your God ... you shall have no other gods before me." He is God; there is no other, and He makes no bones about letting us mere creatures know that.

Secondly, because He <u>deserves</u> all of our respect. He is infinitely good, infinitely wise, infinitely powerful—what's not to respect? To fail to give Him the respect that we owe to Him is to be ignorant, or stupid, or both.

The Bible says that the fear of God is the beginning of wisdom (Proverbs 9:10). "Fear" here doesn't mean that we are to be afraid of Him—unless we disrespect Him; unless we set ourselves up in opposition to Him in the god business. Then we had better be afraid, because that kind of activity leads to strong and painful correction.

But really, God is not standing by with a giant flyswatter to smash us if we offend Him. He would much rather that we would respect Him. Look at this

verse: He has told you, O man, what is good; and what does the LORD require of you but to do justice, and to love kindness, and to walk humbly with your God? (Micah 6:8) All He asks of us, I believe, is that we accept Him, and our relationship with Him, on His terms.



All honor, glory, and respect are Yours, O LORD, our God, our Savior, our Peace, our Joy, our health—our everything!
