Deep Forgiveness

"You can't take it with you." This well-known saying usually refers to physical things such as money or possessions. When you die and show up at Heaven's front gate, you will have left all of your physical "stuff" behind on Earth.

What about your other stuff -- your memories, ideas, attitudes, whatever -- things you carry in your soul? Will you leave all of that behind?

I can't give you a knowledgeable answer, of course, because I don't know for sure, but I'll tell you what I think. I believe that the good stuff -- the love you have given and received, the joyful memories, even the good feelings of having been a blessing to others -- those things will stay with you, but the bad stuff -- the anger, the resentment, the greed or envy you might have felt, and so on -- you might carry all of that with you as far as the gate, but if you won't discard it, you won't get in. There is no room in Heaven for any kind of sin -- and unforgiveness, which we find comfortable and very reasonable to hang onto, is a sin because it is selfish and a failure to love.

Jesus taught His disciples (and us) to pray: "Give us today the food we need, and forgive us our sins, as we have forgiven those who sin against us. And don't let us yield to temptation, but rescue us from the evil one."

Then He continued, "If you forgive those who sin against you, your heavenly Father will forgive you. But if you refuse to forgive others, your Father will not forgive your sins." (Matt. 5:11-16 NLT)

Notice a very important fact here. What separates us from God is not His being unwilling to have us close to Him. His love for us is unconditional and never wavers. No, what keeps us away from Him is our refusal to let go of "stuff" that can't be allowed into His presence.

Think of it this way. Suppose you have been wallowing in mud and garbage and all kinds of filthiness. You show up at the door of a lovely mansion that is all clean and bright and smells nice. The Master says you need a bath before coming in. Are you going to try to go in still hanging onto a handful of filthy stuff?

Do you understand what it actually means to forgive someone who has hurt you? Someone who insulted you, stole from you, abused you, neglected you, or did not love you enough? Maybe even someone who hurt you badly without meaning to hurt you at all?

What does it mean, this forgiveness that Jesus was talking about? I believe it means don't let that injury—

that insult or abuse or neglect or whatever it was—don't let it continue to affect the way you relate to that person. Consider that injury, whatever it was, no longer worth thinking about. If you do happen to think of it, be quick to dismiss that thought as foolishness, something either your own mind or Satan wanted to bother you with, but not something that matters. Because <u>it does not matter</u> any more. That's what forgiveness is.

If what hurt you was trivial, it's easy to dismiss it and move on. But if you were deeply hurt, or believe you were, it isn't easy to forgive. You might say you have forgiven; you might even think you have; but if you still feel the hurt, and especially if you use that hurt as an excuse for not loving a person, then you have not forgiven. If you are still harboring some bitterness, some anger, some resentment deep down in your soul, then you are carrying around some "excess baggage."

Why forgive? (1) Jesus said to forgive; in fact, if you won't forgive, you prevent God from forgiving you. <u>That should make you think</u>. (2) Negative garbage like anger, bitterness, and worry, is poison for your soul. Your anger does nothing to hurt the person who hurt you. Dwelling on the memory of the injury just prolongs the pain. In other words, by not letting go of it, you are letting it hurt you again, on and on.

How do you forgive, when it's hard? I heard a teaching once about Romans 12:1-2, that offering oneself as a living sacrifice is how we should worship God. The teacher said, "Picture an altar, and lay yourself upon it as a sacrifice. And if you find that you have slipped or fallen off the altar, climb back on it and lie down."

Our lives -- including our emotions such as anger and bitterness -- need to be sacrificed on the altar of God's unfailing love. Jesus took all of our sins with Him to the Cross. If we will let them go, He will finish that cleanup job.

Dig deep. Find the buried anger and let Jesus get rid of it for you. And the next time you see a shadow of it or hear an echo of its noise, just ignore it.
