The Ten Commandments

(Mark 10:17-21) As [Jesus] was setting out on his journey, a man ran up and knelt before him and asked him, "Good Teacher, what must I do to inherit eternal life?" And Jesus said to him, "Why do you call me good? No one is good except God alone. You know the commandments: 'Do not murder, Do not commit adultery, Do not steal, Do not bear false witness, Do not defraud, Honor your father and mother." And he said to him, "Teacher, all these I have kept from my youth." And Jesus, looking at him, loved him, and said to him, "You lack one thing: go, sell all that you have and give to the poor, and you

will have treasure in heaven; and come, follow me,"

Here are the Ten Commandments, taken from Exodus 20:1-17. I have shortened and simplified them, to get to the essence of what they say to us.

- 1. I am the Lord your God. You shall have no other Gods before me.
- 2. You shall not worship any idols.
- 3. You shall not misuse the name of God.
- 4. Remember the Sabbath day, and keep it
- 5. Honor your father and your mother.
- 6. You shall not murder.
- 7. You shall not commit adultery.
- 8. You shall not steal.
- 9. You shall not give false testimony against your neighbor.
- 10. You shall not covet anything that belongs to your neighbor.

My brothers and sisters in Christ, do we obey our Lord? Do we keep even these Ten Commandments, as simple and straightforward as they are? Let's examine ourselves.

1. God is God. Do not have, or serve, or cater to, or worship any other gods.

For every one of us, the god we are most likely to serve in place of the true God is the god of self. We are born selfish, self-serving, and prideful, and without God's help we will remain in the same condition all of our lives and die that way. Jesus tells

us how to overcome this. He says, "Deny yourself. Take up your cross [obedience] every day and follow me. Take my yoke [obedience] upon your shoulders and learn from me how to be gentle and humble (see Matthew 16:24 and 11:29, on page 3 of this issue).

2. Don't worship any idols.

An idol is not necessarily an image of something made of stone or metal. An idol is anything that is more important to you than God. Philippians 3:19 scornfully of those whose "god is their belly" and whose "minds are set on earthly things." If you give too much importance to a "star" of music or film or sports, or if you are simply



more self-indulgent than you should be, you are into idol worship.

A note about addiction: if you're addicted to anything - tobacco, alcohol, drugs, gossip, gambling, sex, pornography, overeating, anything at all — then that thing, for you, is an idol.

3. Don't misuse the name of God.

Most people think of this in terms of swearing, and that's correct. Any word of condemnation — even "DARN!" — is misusing God's name, because only God has authority to condemn or curse anyone or anything. Also, using His name as an exclamation of surprise or disgust, as in "Oh my God!" (or "OMG" in a text message), or "Jesus Christ!," is just as bad. God's name should always be used, with reverence, to praise Him or tell others about Him. And that's all.

But there's another way to misuse God's name. If you call yourself a Christian, and you don't try to live as followers of Jesus are supposed to live, obeying His commands (see John 14:15), then you are misusing the name of God (i.e. "Christ"). If you "talk the talk" without "walking the walk," you are disobeying this commandment.

4. Remember the Sabbath day, and keep it holy.

Whether you observe a Sabbath day on Saturday or Sunday, there is supposed to be one day each week when you take your focus off of yourself and your

own pursuits, and devote your time and your attention to the Lord. How many of us actually do that? How many of us even try? How many of us even want to?



Saturday is for doing all those things that can't be done on a weekday, for whatever reason.

Sunday is for eating junk food and watching sports on television. Isn't that how we think? It's sad.

5. Honor your father and your mother.

Some of us do a pretty good job of this, up to a point. Many of us don't.

What does "honor" mean in this context? First, it isn't conditional. Don't honor them because they are honorable; treat them with honor, respect, kindness, gratitude, and love, no matter whether they seem worthy or not. Honor them, and let them see that you are doing so. You have no idea what God can do in your life and theirs, if you obey this commandment.

What if you didn't have two parents? What if your father abandoned you and your mother never had time to meet your needs, and you were raised by someone else? Then, first of all, don't bad-mouth your delinquent parent(s); and, second, give full parental honor to the one(s) who actually served you as a parent.

- 6. You shall not murder anyone.
- 7. You shall not commit adultery.
- 8. You shall not steal.

All three of these are about taking something from someone that is not yours to take. Murder is taking someone's life; adultery is damaging or destroying a marriage relationship (yours and your spouse's, or another's, or both); and stealing is, well, stealing. Those of us who want to feel good about ourselves can say, "Well, at least I haven't done those three things." As if that is an excuse for breaking other commandments.

But even if you actually <u>have</u> done one or more of those three things, the commandments are still in effect. Don't do those things again.

One more thing: watch what you say. Jesus says that calling someone a fool is as wrong as murder (see *Matthew 5:21-22*). Don't put people down.

9. You shall not give false testimony against your neighbor.

With the parable we call "The Good Samaritan," Jesus declared that <u>everyone</u> is your neighbor. Some say this is an injunction against all lying, and that well may be so. Luther's take on it was as follows: "We should fear and love God so that we do not tell lies about our neighbor, betray him, slander him, or hurt his reputation, but defend him, speak well of him, and explain everything in the kindest way." My own version is that when we speak, we should always "speak the truth, in love" (see Ephesians 4:15).

10. You shall not covet anything that belongs to your neighbor.

Desiring something (or someone) that belongs to someone else is like wanting to steal, without actually doing it. It's an offense against your neighbor, who would be deprived of it if you had your way; and it's also an offense against the Lord, who provided it for your neighbor, and who does not want you to desire things for your own gratification or pleasure, but wants you to desire a closer relationship with Himself.

Now, having looked at the Ten Commandments, probably for the first time in a long while, what have we learned?

First, if obeying the commandments is required for salvation, we're lost. I'm a sinner, and so are you. All praise and thanks to our God, that our Savior has paid the awful penalty for our sins!

The second thing we can learn is that, even if we fail to obey every one of these commandments perfectly, we should still try hard to obey them. They are not out-



of-date; they are still good commands. And they are not given for God's benefit; they are for the benefit of His people — us. When we obey God, we not only please Him; we actually change ourselves a little bit. We become more like Jesus; more in tune with truth and goodness and heavenly joy.

Fortunately, we have good help — three helps, in fact: the Word of God (the Bible), prayer, and the guidance of the Holy Spirit. If we will dedicate ourselves to obeying God, and make use of these three helps that He has provided, we will please Him and grow in Christ -- and call ourselves "Christian" with peace and joy!
