#### You Must Be Perfect

Jesus covered a lot of territory in the "Sermon on the Mount," as recorded in the book of Matthew. One statement in particular can cause much concern. He said. "You must be perfect, as your heavenly Father is



perfect." What do you think He meant by that?

First of all, let's look at it in context. At that point in the sermon He was talking about loving others. "You have heard that it was said, 'You shall love your neighbor and hate your enemy.' But I say to you, Love your enemies and pray for those who persecute you, so that you may be sons of your Father who is in heaven. For he makes his sun rise on the evil and on the good, and sends rain on the just and on the unjust. For if you love those who love you, what reward do you have? Do not even the tax collectors do the same? And if you greet only your brothers, what more are you doing than others? Do not even the Gentiles do the same? You therefore must be perfect, as your heavenly Father is perfect." (Matthew 5:43-48)

So we can say, for sure, that His words mean we are to love others the way God loves us — unselfishly and unconditionally. Of course, there's more to it than that. Jesus included many other instructions for our behavior in that magnificent sermon. "Be perfect" stands out as kind of a summary for all of them.

We don't have the original Aramaic words that Jesus spoke. What you and I have are one or more versions that have been translated into English from the original Greek Bible text. But let's take a good look

Perfect

at what we have, specifically these four words: You must be perfect. What do they mean for us today?

Must Be You. Jesus was addressing not just those who were listening to Him, but everyone who hears or reads His

words, including you and me. We must be perfect.

**Must**. This is not a suggestion; it's a command. It's a requirement. We must be perfect. It is not optional.

Be. This doesn't mean, "become." It isn't just "pie in the sky by and by." God commands us to be perfect, right now.

Perfect. This has several meanings, all in this one word. To be perfect as our God is perfect means to be mature, complete, sinless, without any flaws. Perfect.

Wow. How do we deal with this? Let's begin by trying to understand its purpose.

"You must be perfect" is a command that we obviously cannot obey. Can I be perfect? No, I can't. Can you achieve perfection? No. You can't. No human being has ever been perfect, except one, Jesus, the man who is also God.

Why would God give us a command we cannot possibly obey? Because He wants us to realize that, even though we can't do it, He can. We can never earn our way into Heaven. We need to depend on Him to earn it for us.

And He has done it. In Jesus' words, spoken to Nicodemus: "For God so loved the world, that he gave his only Son, that whoever believes in him should not perish but have eternal life. For God did not send his Son into the world to condemn the world, but in order that the world might be saved through him." (John 3:16-17)

Jesus said, "You must be perfect," then He added, in effect, "Here, let me help." He suffered horribly and died on the cross to make us perfect. When He said, "It is finished," He was referring, among other things, to the work of making human beings perfect.

Because of Jesus' sacrificial death on the cross, all of your sins are forgiven. All of my sins are forgiven. In God's sight you and I are as pure and innocent as if we had never done a sinful act or had a sinful thought. Thanks to Jesus, we are perfect.

There's a sign I have seen in offices or on desks that says, "Please be patient. God isn't finished with me yet." This is so true. By His death, Jesus did a finished work <u>for</u> you and me. But He only began the work that still needs to be done <u>in</u> us.

Consider this: God our Savior ... desires all people to be saved and to come to the knowledge of the truth. (1 Timothy 3-4) Notice that there are two processes here. First, God wants all people to be saved — which is the work Jesus did on the cross. Salvation is freely available now to every person who will accept it. Then, secondly, God wants all people to come to know the truth. What truth? The truth that is the entire message of the Holy Scriptures — we were created to enter into an eternal love relationship with God. The whole Bible is God saying to us, "Come to me. Come, be my adopted child; come share in my joy forever!"

How do we come to know the truth? Jesus said, "I am the way, and the truth, and the life. No one comes to the Father except through me." (John 14:6) "But the Helper, the Holy Spirit, whom the Father will send in my name, he will teach you all things ... he will guide you into all the truth." (John 14:26,16:13) We come to the knowledge of the truth when we get to know Jesus, and the Holy Spirit is given to us to guide us to that knowledge.

The Apostle Paul wrote, "If anyone is in Christ, he is a new creation. The old has passed away; behold, the new has come. (2 Corinthians 5:17) To be "in Christ" is to be created brand new, without sins, perfect. Now, how do we stay that way? It's very simple — not easy, but simple. We put ourselves completely in God's hands. I appeal to you ... present your bodies as a living sacrifice, holy and acceptable to God, which is your spiritual worship. Do not be conformed to this world, but be transformed by the renewal of your mind, that by testing you may discern what is the will of God, what is good and acceptable and perfect. (Romans 12:1-2)

Think of a potter, taking a lump of clay into his hands, looking at it, feeling it, and saying, "This is just the clay that I want, it's perfect." The lump of clay is perfect for the purpose he intends for it. Then he goes to work, and with the energy of the wheel, the judicious application a little water, and the expert work

of his hands, the potter gradually changes that lump of clay into a the finished vessel that he intended it to be. Then he bakes it in an oven to make it durable.

What is the clay's part in this process? Very simply, the clay has to be obedient, and allow the potter, the wheel, and the oven do all that they do.

As with any analogy, this one is limited. But Paul's words are key: "be transformed by the renewing of your mind." This is accomplished in us by the work of the Holy Spirit as we read and study God's word, listen to sound teaching, come near to God in prayer, strive to do God's will, and share in loving fellowship with other believers in Jesus.

As we grow in Christ, we become more like Him — "we shall be like Him", (1 John 3:2). And the evidence of this is the fruit of the Holy Spirit — love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control (Galatians 5:22-23) — becoming more and more evident in our lives.

The transformation from unrepentant sinner to sinless saint is not quick, it's never easy, and it's also not painless. But it is worth the effort and whatever pain is involved. It is worth it to us, and it was and still is worth it to Jesus — He died not just to save us <u>from</u> Hell, but also to save us <u>for</u> Heaven. Heaven is the destiny

God planned for us. It is ours, and it is free. It is up to us to let God get us ready for it. And as our hearts grow more in tune with God's plan for our lives, we'll know the joy of Heaven, in a small but wonderful way, even before we get there.



We need to say "yes" to God's invitation to be saved, His way, by Christ's death, and to be transformed into Christ's likeness, by following the Holy Spirit as He guides us into the truth. And I say to you, as Paul wrote, "I am sure of this, that he who began a good work in you [and me] will bring it to completion at the day of Jesus Christ." (Philippians 1:6)
